# Coinage of Queen Victoria under the East India Company (1840 1861)





CONTINUOUS LEGEND DATED 1840. The Legend on the Obverse, VICTORIA QUEEN, carries on over the

After the death of her uncle King William Henry IV on 20<sup>th</sup> June 1837, Queen Victoria came to the throne. Coins were struck during her long reign of about 64 years. Silver Rupee coins with the effigy of Queen Victoria (Continuous Legend) were announced by PROCLAMATION dated 18<sup>th</sup> November 1840. The obverse was from a matrix engraved under the supervision of Mr Boulton, Soho Mint, Birmingham. England.

In the First Series of the Queen's coinage (with Continuous Legend), the only initials came across is 'S' incuse, on the truncation of the Queen's neck. This initial are of Mint Master, Major J. T. Smith. Of Madras Mint from February 1840 to September 1855. Yet another mark attributed to the Madras Mint is a small 'v' in relief. This is located on the reverse, on the fold of the right bow of the ribbon. Another mark 'M' in relief or incuse on the end tip of the left ribbon bow is also found in reverse of some specimens of silver rupee coins. 'M' in relief attributed to Madras Mint & 'M' incuse attributed to Calcutta Mint.

The crescent (U) is found, in relief, on the top left portion of the ribbon bow on the reverse. Being in relief, this mint-mark is only visible on coins in either EF or UNC condition. The crescent mark can be compared to a similar mint-mark which occurs on some of the Calcutta-minted Presidency series. It was the private mark of the Calcutta Mint.

Silver Rupee Coins of Queen Victoria (Continuous Legend) were struck at three mints, Calcutta, Bombay & Madras. The quantities of silver rupee coins struck at three mints were Calcutta 179,934,670 coins, Bombay 109,838,073 coins & Madras 21,898,181 coins.

Silver rupee coins without visible crescent mark or any Mint-Mark in obverse & reverse can be attributed by their diameter 31.1mm to 31.6mm to Calcutta Mint, & diameter 31.7mm & above to Bombay Mint.

There are four differences in the number of berries in the wreath on the reverse of silver rupee coins in Continuous Legend. The number in the left & right segments being, 1<sup>st</sup>. left 10 berries & right 9 berries = 19 Berries, 2<sup>nd</sup>. left 10 berries & right 10 berries = 20 Berries, 3<sup>rd</sup>. left 20 berries & right 15 berries = 35 berries & finally 4<sup>th</sup>. left 20 berries & right 14 berries = 34 berries.


# **Academic Recognition to Philately**

**DIVIDED LEGEND DATED 1840.** The Legend on the Obverse, VICTORIA QUEEN, is divided by the Queen's head.

The obverse design was prepared by William Wyon, Royal Mint, London. The reverse was copied by the Calcutta engraver Kasinath Dass from Wyon's pattern of 1849. They were struck at the three Indian mints in continuation of Continuous Legend until the year 1862, when the Imperial series commenced.

In the Second series of the Queen's coinage (with Divided Legend), the initials came across were 'W.W'. raised, 'W.W.B' raised, 'W.W.BO' raised & 'W.W.S' raised. As mentioned earlier, 'W.W'. stands for William Wyon, the Chief Engraver at the Royal Mint, London, who had been responsible for the 'Master Matrices' for King William IV & Queen Victoria coinage under Company Administration. The presence of his initials on all coins of the Second series (with Divided Legend), but not on the First series (with Continuous Legend), or on King William IV coins indicate the initiation of a new policy to have the name of the engraver recorded on the coins struck.

Those coins stamped with the 'W.W.S' are a continuation of the Madras Mint issues & belong to the period 1851-1855. However, 'W.W.S' is in relief. It appears to be the initials of J. T. Smith Mint Master at Madras Mint from Feb 1840 to Sept 1855.

The initial 'W.W.B', also in relief, has only been traced

on the rupee denomination. It appears to be the initials of Brevet Major J. H. Bell, who followed J. T. Smith in the appointment of Mint Master at Madras & who retained the office from Sept 1855 until April 1859. Another rupee has been observed with the letters 'W.W. BO' in the truncation, All letters in relief. This, too, is a product of Madras Mint. J. H. Bell was followed by a Major C. A. Orr. His term of office extended from 1859-1864, a period which extends beyond the last year of striking of Divided Legend coins. From the marking of the coin it would seem that instead of cutting a new matrix for the obverse, Orr's initial 'O' was added after the 'B' for Bell.

In the distinction between Bombay & Calcutta Mints, no mark or unusual feature in the design has been traced that could be assigned to either mint. Coins with the truncation impressed with the initials W.W. (William Wyon) alone are therefore classed as common to both the mints of Bombay & Calcutta. The only way to decipher coins between Bombay & Calcutta Mints is by their circumference, diameter 30.6mm or below Calcutta Mint & diameter 30.7mm and above Bombay Mint.

Silver Rupee Coins of Queen Victoria (divided legend) were struck at three mints, Calcutta, Bombay & Madras. The quantities of silver rupee coins struck at three mints were Calcutta 398,553,660 coins, Bombay 312,598,076 coins & Madras 55,049,201 coins.

There are four differences in the number of berries in the wreath on the reverse of rupee coins. The number in the left & right segments being 1<sup>st</sup>. left 13 berries & right 12 berries = 25 Berries, 2<sup>nd</sup>. Left 13 berries & right 15 berries = 28 Berries, 3<sup>rd</sup> Left 13 berries & right 16 berries = 29 Berries & 4<sup>th</sup>. Left 14 berries & right 15 berries = 29 Berries.
