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# **Tooled Error Notes with Identical Serial Numbers**

Error is the current Hot Cake in the Banknotes market, which has motivated forgers to make some fake error Notes. Most popular and expensive error today is Same Serial Error notes. This means a pair of 2 notes both with identical Prefix, Inset, Serial Numbers, Signature and Year. Such errors are rare and genuine errors do exist. This happens usually when during the printing process the machine is stuck and the same number is printed twice. Reason for it being Rare and Expensive is such a flaw is unique and rarely found.







Recently, I saw such same serial number notes also known as identical number error in 100 Rupees denomination with signature of the Governor Bimal Jalan. To my surprise, this was the most well made forgery I ever came across .A

newbie would never even doubt it as forgery. We normally check the note and most important test is UV - Light test. Fortunately, since it was Mahatma Gandhi series bank note UV-Light check was possible. The Note passed the Uv-light

test all numbers were genuine. I touched the serial numbers several times to see if the number was pasted: I tried seeing in normal light to find traces of number stuck over it but everything was perfect, and your touch won't even feel anything on note. Later I used a Lens to check each and every number and there I found a minute difference in the pattern of printing step of note. After viewing through high lens again I found a small minute cut which I could not even feel by hand as it was so well tooled. I tried using my nails and than some part of the number which was pasted was peeled off to confirm it was a Tooled Forgery. The last number was changed in such a way that it will pass all the test of being a genuine note



In the above image check the portion where I have circled the particular lines. When examined through lens, they showed a difference in printing pattern I was talking about. The lines were not symmetrical and therefore we could identify it as tooled forgery.


# How they do it:

Forger carefully uses a blade to remove a small portion of note, which may be last or any number from between or even prefix. They are really good at it as the backside of note won't have any traces of the same, only the front side is peeled off and than same thing is done on other note to take out a number, and they will always take the same position number, i.e if they are

changing the last number they will take last number only from other note to maintain the pattern. Then that part is pasted on the other note. They paste it so perfectly that your fingers will never feel that they are pasted and since they take it from original note it will definitely pass the UV-Light test as number is genuine from other note. Even if you hold the note towards the source of light you won't see a trace of forgery.


# Few Tips to avoid such forgery

- Certify it: There are companies like NGS, NGC and PCGS who grade such error notes, grade it if you are in doubt BUT grade both notes together as error notes. If you give single note at a time grader wont even think that a number might be forged or tooled because at that time he is not checking for error he is just checking for genuineness of note which will be genuine so Grading both notes at same time in same folder is very very important.
- Old Series, i.e before Mahatma Gandhi Series do not respond to UV-Light test because the fluorescence security feature of serial number began from Mahatma Gandhi Series so be careful if old issues are offered for sale.
- Use a Good High Lens to check the numbers. see the 1<sup>St</sup> printing design behind the serial numbers vou can only find traces of it over there.
- Better be Safe than Sorry ,avoid buying anything in which you have even a small doubt.


